Course Description

This course presents an overview of poverty, inequality and fiscal redistribution analysis. Topics include measuring poverty and inequality, fiscal incidence analysis and learning about the characteristic of modern welfare states. Using the CEQ framework and welfare state theory, the student will produce a taxonomy of welfare states in countries studied by the CEQ Institute.

Pre-requisites: Intermediate Micro and Macroeconomics. No prior knowledge of Stata is required.

Objective and Learning Outcomes

The purpose of this course is to learn how to prepare an analytical synthesis of the existing body of knowledge on topics covered in a poverty assessment. In particular, by the end of the semester students should have learned:

- i. The basic analytics of poverty and inequality measures; the determinants of poverty; and, antipoverty policies (including the incidence of benefits and taxes).
- ii. Main trends in the evolution of poverty and inequality in the world.
- iii. To learn the basics of fiscal incidence analysis.
- iv. To learn about the characteristics of the welfare state in developing countries.
- v. To produce analytical reports on poverty measurement, fiscal incidence analysis and characteristics of the welfare states.

Program Outcomes

This course contributes to the program outcomes for the BA, BS and MA degrees in Economics by allowing students to demonstrate competency in specialized areas in economics (poverty and inequality analysis).

Organization

The course will be conducted as a seminar and the student is expected to produce weekly reports on topics covered.
